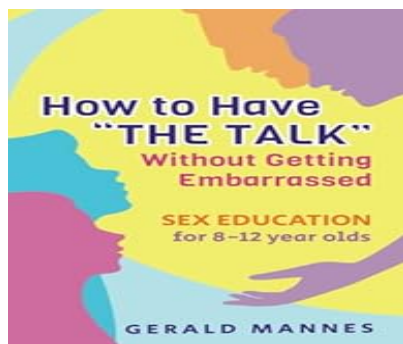

In the past I have brushed off questions

such as “Where do babies come from” because of how much easier it would be than trying to explain to an 8 year old: After reading the book I feel that I am confident and even eager to have this conversation with my son. If we don’t teach our kids this information they will seek it elsewhere like the internet which than likely will not be age appropriate.
