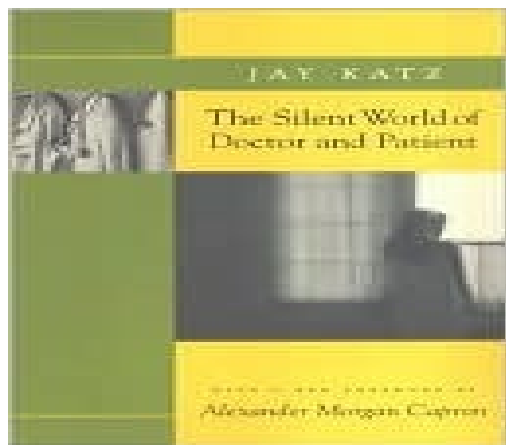


Book The Silent World of Doctor and patient gateway
