Tackling the same twisted subject as Stacy Schiff's much-lauded book *The Witches: Salem 1692* this Sibert Honor book for young readers features unique scratchboard illustrations chilling primary source material and powerful narrative to tell the true tale. **A discovery of witches book series**

The riveting true story of the victims accused witches crooked officials and mass hysteria that turned a mysterious illness affecting two children into a witch hunt that took over a dozen people's lives and ruined hundreds more unfolds in chilling novelistic detail—complete with stylized black-white-and-red scratchboard illustrations of young girls having wild fits in the courtroom witches flying overhead and the Devil and his servants terrorizing the Puritans— in this young adult book by award-winning author and illustrator Rosalyn Schanzer. **Witches and demons book** From there we'd give praise to good Apple paperbacks like *The Girl With the Silver Eyes* or pretty much anything with a ghost in it (does anyone even remember *Ghost Cat?*) but eventually I'd have to start pushing myself. **Discovery of witches books series kindle** When 9-year-old Betty Parris and 11-year-old Abigail Williams began to twist and turn in the home of the Reverend Samuel Parris there was only one possible reason for it: witchcraft. **Book witches** What they didn't know was that the afflicted girls would be joined by fellow accusers and launch the town and even parts of the state into a series of witch trials the land of America had never seen before. **A discovery of witches book series** Here I am thirty-three years of age with a Masters degree to my name and if you had asked me to recount exactly what happened during the Salem Witch Trials I'd have been hard pressed to come up with anything I didn't just learn from Arthur Miller's *The Crucible*. **Witches jokes** You see the "crime" the characters and the endless strange courtroom scenes (Note: Teacher's wishing to spice up their history presentations should definitely make Law & Order-like videos of the Witch Trials). **Kindle which version** Black and white with the occasional use of bloody red (the endpapers are a nice touch) Schanzer illustrates both the true facts of the case as well as the wild suppositions poised by the accusers. **A discovery of witches book** 5 stars Very easily readable novel and easily understandable (chapters are relatively short)** Decided since it's October and this seems to be a spooky month to do a short side trip to Salem Massachusetts ** I absolutely love the Salem Witch Trials . **Witches craig** For instance this one was done with illustrations of the different people involved in the Salem Witch Trials but also it was written for young adults so was very basic level understanding. **A discovery of witches book series** I am so glad that in today's world our justice system is much improved in ways since 1692 as we now use the term Innocent until proven guilty and we also base things on actual evidence not like back then on spectral evidence (supernatural tinglings so to speak). **A discovery of witches book series** Invisible World - supernatural tinglings so to speak (the hearsay of the witch trials)The author however does present different theories as to what perhaps caused this baffling event to unfold such as perhaps the accusers of innocent people were suffering from illnesses or perhaps what is known today as post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) as remember that during this time in history the English and the Indians were at war with each other (Indian Wars) and innocent lives were taken and some members of the families witnessed these brutalities firsthand with their own eyes. **Witches craig** 5 stars as it doesn't uncover really anything I already knew from my learnings on this topic or as mentioned my previous read earlier this year but because of the illustrations throughout the novel. **Witch's formula crossword** Bought this one on trip to Salem this past October and although a quick read

This was Salem Massachusetts where the Puritan populace knew anything was possible, **Free kindle books witches and fantasy** Rosalyn Schanzer tells it like it is recounting many of the details giving information on what happened to all the players when the dust settled and things got back to normal, **Witches den** Notes a Bibliography an Index and a Note From the Author explaining how she abridged updated and clarified some of the original texts follow at the end. **Pdf witches still live** And I didn't even know how much I didn't know until I started reading Schanzer's book: **Witches craig** Ordinarily a book like this would start with an Introduction that would sum up everything that happened lickety split, **Ebook with connect** There's a preface sure as shooting but the author makes the executive decision to start off with the most interesting aspect of this story: witches: **Witches gulch** "Anyone could be a witch - your own mother or father your best friend your tiny baby brother or even your dog: **Watches pdf** And you might never know who was in league with the Devil until it was too late, **Witches and demons book** " From the get-go Schanzer is asking the reader without being obvious about it to walk in the shoes of a Puritan: **Witch kindle books** I know books for adults that have a hard time doing this so to find it here in a title for the under 21-set is admirable to say the least, **Witches and demons**

book The book begins with an explanation that when the Puritans immigrated to America they brought with them “a stowaway from their former home. **Witches fingers** ” That would be an idea that the Invisible World was just as tangible as the Natural World. **Witches formula 5** It sets the stage for what is to come and if it does not excuse the actions of the characters it at least gives their reasoning however weak. **Witches fingers** I was particularly impressed with the way in which Schanzer chose to refrain from inserting our contemporary views and theories into the text, **Witch public domain** When you at last reach the end you find a chapter called “The End is Here” which addresses some questions folks have had about the trials, **Witch's house osrs** Even then the author doesn't lay down the law and say “this definitely happened” or “we have no doubt of that”: **Witches journal** The idea that the grain in Salem had a mold in it may be trendy one day and then dismissed the next. **Pdf witches still live** By giving equal weight to various theories Schanzer ensures that the book won't be dating itself any time soon, **Watches pdf** When we think of nonfiction images particularly those found in books published by companies like National Geographic we think of photographs, **Witch's house osrs** And if we happen to be dealing with a point in history that came before the birth of the F-stop then we expect to see public domain images of the time, **Witches craig** Usually paintings or prints made after the fact (and with scant attention to historical accuracy but that's neither here nor there), **Witchskull band** To incorporate original art into a book for tweens and teens is more acceptable now that graphic novels have reached a kind of grudging acceptance from the mainstream: **Witches pdf** And what art! Little wonder that the book has already garnered the prestigious Gold Medal for Best Illustrated Book of 2011 from the Society of Illustrators Original Art Exhibition: **Witches brew** Schanzer (who both wrote and illustrated the book believe it or not) uses the Ampersands Scratchboard medium for this particular work. **Witches kindle unlimited** The pictures actually lighten the tone of the book a bit: **A discovery of witches book series** Some of this stuff is pretty bleak but Schanzer's pictures have a bit of drollery to them (the dogs help). **Witches fingers** I was also taken with the font (not usually my area of expertise) which is listed as Caslon Antique and P22 Franklin Caslon. **Witches forest** It makes the book look as if it was written in the past on an ancient printing press, **Book witches of east end** So if you're a librarian teacher or parent and you need to do a bit of booktalking with a work of historical nonfiction **Witches!** is the answer to your prayers: **Witches books series** I think all you'd have to do would be to recount one or two of the accusations to get the kids alert and awake: **Witches gulch** Then mention this fact to them: In a witch-hunt nobody is safe, **Witches craig** It's the immediacy of the material that makes this story all the scarier, **Witches den** If you're looking for some straight history to entrance the kids **Witches!** makes for a fantastic addition: **A discovery of witches book series** I am still baffled yet intrigued as to how this dark period of America's history was allowed to happen yet no one stopped it or tried to make it right. **Witch's formula crossword** This is my second non fiction read this year on this topic. **Witches in salem** My first was back in March reading Stacy Schiff's *The Witches: Salem 1692*, **Witch's heart** This one however even though it tackled the same daunting topic as the previous one did was different on its own merits. **Book witches** This would be a great book for teachers to use in schools to teach students about this topic which needs to be taught. **Book witches time travel photography** ** If interested in seeing my review for the above mentioned book see link below **<https://www>, **Witch's heart** Back then the Puritans (New England folks) believed in two (2) different worlds:1, **Witches den** Natural World - human beings and everything we can see touch or feel (like we do in today's world)2: **Witches text** I am giving this novel *Witches: The Absolutely True Tale of Disaster in Salem* (History a rating of 3: **Witches gulch** Mind you it does add a little more such as the “theories” and the facts provided about the two “worlds” that the Puritans believed in: **Witches midwives and nurses pdf** Kindle Edition And perhaps worst of all were the Devil's witches for they could hide in the land of mortals to cast their spells upon the innocent: **Witches journal** I've read a fair few of National Geographic's YA and middle grade nonfiction and they tend to be large with gorgeous glossy covers: **Witches gulch** It's small even smaller than an average paperback and the cover is a black and white engraving-like illustration: **A discovery of witches book** Let's face it you'd have to try pretty hard

Like I said I haven't read tons of books on the trials. **Witchery** But this is by far the best one that I've read and the one that comes closest to capturing the mood of the times, **Starry hollow witches book series** National Geographic also has a fantastic interactive story on their website that though not related to this particular book also does a great job of capturing that mood, **The witches of scotland book 1** The presentation is a little dated right now but the writing is great, **Witches den** Kindle Edition This was a really good and informational book, **Book witches of east end** I have become more interested in this part of history for a while now and I am glad I could educate myself on the subject. **Witches books series** Kindle Edition Excellent book about the Salem witch trials!
